COUNTDOWN TO CONSUL'S IOOTH

Number of Days to the Kick-off: 281



It's harvest time across the prairies, but we don't do it like this anymore! Everyone has seen these types of old harvest pictures. This one is of Axel Madsen and his brothers threshing at Covlins, likely in the 1920s. Just looking at this photo, you can tell that the harvest took a lot more manpower and time back then.

Imagine, too, just how hot and tiring this work was. To start the day, whoever owned the steam engine would come before breakfast and would fire it up so he would get enough steam to be able to run for the day. A few days earlier, one machine would have cut the wheat and then bound the stalks into stooks just big enough for a man or boy to carry. The stooks were gathered on threshing days and brought to a centrally located thresher machine. Farmers fed the wheat into the machine where the stalks were beaten and flailed to separate the wheat seeds from the stalks and chaff. Other farmers had the job of hauling the wheat to a granary or elevator. No air conditioning or machines with cabs for these workers!

While the men and boys worked in the field, farm women and girls faced long hours in a steamy hot kitchen, preparing meals for hungry field hands. With no microwave oven, refrigerator, or frozen foods to ease the work, the women cooked and baked for several days in a row, fixing huge meals for the threshing crews. As with field work, neighbour women shared the cooking and kitchen work. At threshing time, even children helped. Older boys loaded bundles of wheat into the threshing cylinder and piled up straw that was used later for livestock bedding and to stuff mattresses. Older girls worked in the kitchen, helping cook platters of fried chicken or roast beef, potatoes and gravy, beans and squash, homemade bread and butter, pies and cakes and much more to feed the hungry workers. Little girls ran back and forth to the field, carrying sandwiches and snacks to workers, and little boys hauled jugs of cool water to workers in the hot, dusty fields.

It took many weeks and many hands to get the harvest done, but the fellowship with neighbours and the satisfaction of a job well-done for everyone involved made it all worthwhile. And just like today, what a relief when it was all done!


