SUSTAINABLE CANADA ASSOCIATION TRIANGLE REGION "Common Sense Conservation"

Overview

The Triangle Region lays within the Mixed Grassland Ecoregion of Canada known as Palliser's Triangle. Located in the most southeastern part of Alberta and the most southwestern part of Saskatchewan, forming part of the Great Plains of North America. The Triangle Region's base stretches along the 49th parallel (Canada-USA border) from 106 to 112 degrees longitude with its northern boundary touching the 52nd parallel. Palliser's Triangle was named for the man who first charted the territory, geographer and explorer, John Palliser (1817-1887). This area holds a unique-to-Canada blend of characteristics: semi-arid climate, nutrient-rich brown soils, extraordinary landscapes, and diverse plant and animal communities.

Plant and animal species extirpation and endangerment are not uncommon within the area. Of the plant and animal species currently listed in Canada as extirpated, endangered, threatened, or of special concern, many are native to the Triangle Region. Sustainable Canada Association is committed to working with government and non-government agencies, other nonprofit groups, agriculture, industry, commerce, and residents to effectively manage the Triangle Region's resources.

History

In January 2014 residents of the Triangle Region gathered in response to the first Emergency Protection Order under the auspices of the Species at Risk Act in Canada invoked for the protection of Greater Sage Grouse. They came together in support of establishing a Council that would keep local people involved and informed, increase collaboration, increase funding opportunities, and provide a forum to respond to "Species at Risk" legislation. This was followed by two public informational meetings through which a Steering Committee was formed to draft bylaws, goals, and an action plan which ultimately lead to the formation of Sustainable Canada Association.

Mission

Sustainable Canada Association strives to proactively preserve and improve the economic, social, and environmental interests of the Triangle Region through effective partnerships and sound science.

Vision

A region where community well-being is supported by a vibrant economy, through, in part, a sustainable harvest of resources, while conserving and restoring biodiversity that will endure as our legacy for future generations.

Goal

Identify and recognize stakeholders as an integral component in environmental stewardship and their vital role in balancing conservation and restoration of biodiversity and a prospering economy.
