AND THE TRACKS GROW QUIETER by Ken Armstrong



By the mid-1950s, Canadian Pacific Railway management were growing increasingly concerned about passenger service revenue declines. Given their initial role as a tool of western frontier development, tying together the vast and diverse prairie provinces, the CPR had particular need for an efficient means of serving thinly populated areas such as southwestern Saskatchewan and into southeastern Alberta.

Thus, the little Mixed Trains, hauling general freight, passengers, Post Office mail, and package shipments, provided a cost-effective solution for the CPR.

However, over the years, staring with introduction of all all-weather road network and party -line telephone system in rural Saskatchewan, there were several developments that began to seriously erode Mixed Train patronage and revenues. First to go was a loss of CPR's lucrative Post Office mail contract to box-truck cartage firms providing faster, more frequent weekday service to most area communities.

Subsequently, farmer and merchant demands for same-day or next-day service for everything from farm implement parts, replacement spares, package shipments and such like practically gutted CPR's Mixed Train business trade for those same things. More plentiful availability of cheaper gasoline caused Mixed Train ridership numbers to decline noticeably with fewer and fewer passengers handled each year.

By the late 1950s and early 1960s Mixed Train patronage had declined so badly in rural Saskatchewan, the losses had reached the point whereby management asked, and invariably received, regulatory permission to reduce or discontinue Mixed Train service. Train discontinuance notices appeared on both station bulletin boards and in local newspapers. For Consul and surrounding area, weekly Mixed Train services provided by the two crews were reduced to just one, based in Lethbridge, AB.

Every Monday morning in 1960, Mixed Train M724 departed Lethbridge on its lonely, six-day odyssey, first to Manyberries, Tuesday to Val Marie, Wednesday to Consul, then to Shaunavon on Thursday, to Manyberries on Friday, and back to Lethbridge on Saturdays.

Many well-to-do Americans were known to have made an annual pilgrimage to travel the M724 Mixed Train assignment, enjoying their week of secluded quiet while riding along with and sharing meals and coffee with the train crew, and otherwise enjoying the solitude of the surrounding country that passed by at a leisurely 25 mph. Their days invariably saw these travelers treating the train crew to dinner and libations at the end of the day at a local hotel where the M724 Mixed Train tied up for the night.
