MLA REPORT

Greetings Consul & surrounding communities.

Our province has now seen 52 consecutive quarters of population growth, according to the latest population figures from Statistics Canada. This is a clear sign of the strength of our economy and our quality of life.

Your Saskatchewan Party government will keep standing up for all of them – to protect their livelihoods, their communities and their province. This means fighting the Trudeau Carbon Tax and speaking out against harmful federal legislation such as Bills C-69 and C-48.

The recent passage of Bills C-69 and C-48 marks a dark chapter for our energy and industrial sectors, and is deeply concerning for our government and all those that value the economic prosperity of our nation. Six premiers representing 59 per cent of Canada's population recently wrote to the Prime Minister to outline concerns about how this legislation would harm our economic prosperity in key industries.

Through this legislation, the federal government has sent a clear message to the Canadian and international investment community that they do not support the competitiveness of our wealth generating and job creating sectors.

While the recent approval of the Trans Mountain Expansion project is a positive step, Bills C-69 and C-48 drastically restrict the possibility of further pipeline and industrial projects to be approved or built. Moving into the future, this legislation greatly limits our nation's ability to overcome critical barriers in transporting our energy products to international markets, and selling these products for a fair price.

Our work to keep Saskatchewan issues front and centre, here at home and in Ottawa, will not stop over the summer. We will always advocate for our industries that provide the means to keep Saskatchewan strong and continue our opposition to the Trudeau Carbon Tax, which includes taking the fight to the Supreme Court of Canada.

The Supreme Court has notified the Government of Saskatchewan that Saskatchewan's challenge of the federally-imposed carbon tax has been tentatively scheduled for December 5, 2019.

The Government of Saskatchewan previously announced the appeal to the Supreme Court of Canada following the 3-2 split decision delivered by the Saskatchewan Court of Appeal in May. While our government was disappointed with the split decision at the Court of Appeal, we believe that the federal government has violated the constitutional jurisdiction of the provinces through the imposition of the federal carbon tax.

We look forward to standing up for Saskatchewan against the frivolous and ineffective carbon tax in the Supreme Court. Saskatchewan's Constitutional Law Branch is currently developing the province's factum which is due to be submitted to the Supreme Court of Canada by July 26, 2019, 60 days following the notice of appeal.

At a time when Saskatchewan has been faced with significant economic headwinds, positive wholesale trade statistics show that job creators remain confident in our economy. In April, wholesale trade in Saskatchewan grew 14.7 per cent year-over-year – the highest in Canada. With wholesale trade being a leading indicator of other future economic indicators, it gives us optimism in our economy as we move forward.

4. Think non-conventional

TIPS FOR TAKING SUMMER PHOTOS WITH YOUR SMARTPHONE

1. Get creative

Try shooting the same thing from several different angles for entirely new looks of the same subject. Here are some ideas: Shooting photos from multiple angles is good not only for avoiding brightness, it's also important for producing diverse and creative photos. Stand on a chair or table (carefully!). Shoot from on your belly or crouching down. Lay down on your back and have your subject stand over you. Shoot blind to get angles that aren't otherwise possible. Think of the number of great sports scenes and situations you can capture by increasing the variety of viewpoints.

2. Avoid Underexposure

One of the difficulties of taking photos on a beach, is that the sand and water are reflecting sunlight and often causing your camera to underexpose the photographed object. Due to those bright reflections the camera could get a false reading and lower its exposure resulting in a too-dark foreground image. In that situation it is better to change angles; move around and try to get as few sunlight reflections as possible.

3. Cloudy Days? Ideal For Photos!

Counterintuitively overcast days are perfect for making photographs. In that specific weather condition, clouds are diffusing harsh direct sunlight much like a professional softbox kit. They also decrease high contrast and shadows that occur on a bright day, and create a soft, even light that is great for portraits in particular. Cloudy days produce a diffuse light that's more balanced which is flattering for practically every subject.

Try thinking outside of the box. Take pictures of non-conventional objects or take pictures of objects in a nonconventional way. By taking pictures with your smartphone, you can also be a part of your frame - on the beach you can show your feet, or part of your hand holding your partner's hand.

Capture the object in another way than everybody else. Standing in front of the object is so obvious! Try to take it in a different way. Sometimes your object will look much better as a reflection in the water. If you want to take a picture of an often-photographed subject, you can create a unique image by finding its reflection in the water, especially when the water is still.

5. Make 'em laugh

Evoke emotions! Sometimes the most memorable photos are the ones that make us laugh. Those kind of pictures are unexpected. You can't predict funny situations, but if you have your mobile always with you, your chances of capturing it are pretty big. Be ready for it. It can be an animal in a funny situation, a foreigner or just a part of urban life.
